Summary of bird sightings in the Isle of Man, June 2024

Common Scoter – Seven were seen flying north off Peel on 10th; with 11 on 21st.

Wigeon – Four drakes were present at Strandhall from 21st to the end of the month.

Red-breasted Merganser – A drake was in Peel Bay during the morning on 19th and presumably the same bird at Port Erin in the afternoon.

Black-tailed Godwit – A single bird was at Stinking Dub, Langness on 27th. A flock of 43 passed through POANR on 28th, three remaining the next day.

Greenshank – Single birds were reported from Peel Bay on 25th and Strandhall on 29th. At POANR one on 16th and two on 29th.

Long-tailed Skua* – A pale bird flew south off Peel on 28th.

Yellow-legged Gull* - Two adults and a second summer bird were together in Peel Bay on 27th.

Mediterranean Gull – A breeding plumage bird was at Strandhall on 24th, while a first summer bird passed Peel on the same day. Two were at Langness on 28th.

Swift – Continued records from their typical areas, the highest reported count being 12 over Castletown on 25th.

Calf of Man Interesting Sightings, June 2024

Barnacle Goose – An individual seen at Cow Harbour on 15th, 21st - 23rd & 25th.

Common Scoter – three past South Harbour on 22nd

Red-breasted Merganser – A single bird recorded flying west past South Harbour on 20th may have been the same bird seen at Peel & Port Erin the day before.

Lapwing – Two were recorded on 4th, one seen on 12th & 16th and two on 30th.

Snipe – An individual was recorded on 26th.

Green Sandpiper* - A bird overflew on the morning of 22nd.

Puffin – high counts were of 15 on 27th and 30 on 28th.

Storm Petrel – The first of the year on 16th when three were noted.

Great Tit – a pair fledged young mid-month, the 6th Calf breeding record.

Skylark – a singing bird overflew the Observatory on 26th, the first June record since 2009.

Garden Warbler – A single trapped at the Observatory on 3rd.

Spotted Flycatcher – Four on 3rd was the highest count during the month.

Grey Wagtail – Post-breeding dispersal was noted from mid-month, with three on 15th & 22nd and singles on six other dates.
