Summary of bird sightings in the Isle of Man, March 2025

Brent Goose - 110 at Langness on 31st was the highest count of the month. Two dark-bellied birds were at Strandhall from 20^{th} .

Pink-footed Goose – 107 were at Lough Mallow on 8th.

Whooper Swan – A flock of 40 arrived on Kionslieu on 11th; remaining to 13th.

Pintail – The female at POANR remained; noted on at least six days.

Red-breasted Merganser – A drake reappeared at Langness on 28th & 29th.

Goosander – At Kionslieu six redheads were present on 14^{th} , three on 23^{rd} . Single redheads were at Poyll Richie on 12^{th} and Langness on 13^{th} & 14^{th} .

Greenshank – The single bird between Langness and Derbyhaven remained through the month.

Cattle Egret* – At Cronk Hunna a single bird was present up to 7th with a second bird present again on 1st. Likely the same birds seen with cattle at Ballacreggan, Port St Mary on 20th.

Sandwich Tern – The first of the year was a single at Rue Point on 23rd; another single bird off Scarlett on 28th.

Red Kite* – A bird was seen near the Garey and central hills on 3rd; near Orrisdale (Ballasalla) and near Crosby on 5th.

Hoopoe – Single birds were seen in Douglas gardens on 23rd & 25th; and in Castletown gardens on 24th & 25th suggesting two separate birds.

Sand Martin – An early bird was seen near Cregneash on 6th. The first of the year at POANR was a single on 12th with 48 counted on 23rd. One was at Ballakinnag on 19th.

Swallow – The first report was a single near Cregneash on 20th.

House Martin – A single bird among Swallow and Sand Martin at Patrick on 28th.

Willow Warbler – Early singles included in Peel on 19th, Ballaghennie on 20th, Congary Curragh on 24th and Ballachurry on 23rd & 28th.

Black Redstart – Female type birds remained at Ramsey boatpark until at least 8th and Fenella Bay, Peel from 3rd to 11th. A male was seen at Scard on 20th.

Wheatear – On the Ballaghennie Ayres; four on 19th, seven on 23rd.

Twite – Seven were at POANR on 26th.

Calf of Man Interesting Sightings, March 2025

The Calf team returned to the island on 7th March for the 2025 season

Whooper Swan – A group of 22 overflew on 16th (largest Calf day-count). A satellite-tracked individual overflew on 26th.

Jack Snipe – Singles recorded overnight on 16th & 20th; two on 22nd.

Red Kite* – A single on 8th was the first March record and likely the same individual seen on the mainland.

Goshawk* – A female drifted north on 24th; the 13th Calf record.

Manx Shearwater – The first was observed on land on 20th.

Puffin – Single birds were noted off the West coast on 29th & 30th.

Sand Martin – The first of the year was a single on 8th – the earliest Calf record by four days.

House Martin – Two on 30th were the first of the year.

Swallow – The first of the year were two on 28th.

Black Redstart – A male was briefly at the observatory on 20th.

Willow Warbler – A single on 21st followed by three on 22nd, two on 23rd, 24th & 26th and three on 27th.

Wheatear – The first were seen on 8th with four present (joint-earliest Calf records), with counts rising to 21 on 21st.

Twite – Singles noted on 16th (Gibdale), 19th & 31st (both Kione ny Halby).

Lapland Bunting* - A bird overflew the observatory on 30^{th} – only the third March record and the fourth spring record.
